Canopy Trees

There are trends in trees, just like clothes and cars. In recent years, nurseries are selling fewer large canopy trees and more decorative trees. The one week a year that those decorative trees flower makes a big impression and creates demand.

But canopy trees give Seneca Gardens a sense of stability and are the anchors of our Neighborhood Arboretum. They provide shade to cool our urban heat island, slow the runoff from large rains, and provide shelter and food for hundreds of animals up and down the ecological chain.

In our Seneca Gardens tree program, we have subsidized both for 30-years. Since there are fewer sites available for large trees, we support planting the big trees where there is enough air and root space and the small trees under or around the big trees.

Surprisingly, large trees take up less space at people height than small trees. A 50-year oak trimmed high



only uses only two feet of trunk space at people height, while a 50-year old dogwood - if it lives that long - uses 25 feet of your yard at people height.

This is not an argument to avoid decorative trees. We need both, but look for sites that support canopy trees first.

Paving Project Complete

New Pavement

Milling and paving of streets has been completed. Thank you all for your patience as Seneca Gardens and Hall Contracting navigated through changing weather, plant breakdown, equipment breakdowns and hot weather.

This may be the largest project Seneca Gardens has undertaken since I became a resident 32 years ago. The streets have held up fairly well during that period, but it was time for a refresh. We were

able to do this work using Seneca Gardens Road Fund monies that come from gas taxes supplemented by funds from the American Rescue Plan Act to get the work done without financing.

It may have seemed pretty chaotic at times, but there was a method to the madness. Efforts were made to pave in directions that would keep the asphalt loaded trucks off of the new pavement. At times I'm sure it seemed as though the effort were intending to block every path a driver could take.

Drivers waited patiently for openings, turned around when needed and slowly passed the workers when cleared to go. The contractor commented a number of times about the overall friendliness of Seneca Garden residents.

Speed Humps

Speed humps were restored in nearly the same locations as before with a few minor changes in location. One speed bump on Valletta Rd near Denham was removed as it was no longer seen as necessary the speed hump was installed prior to the stop sign at the intersection).

Meadow Road Patching

Meadow Road and various utility patches on the other streets were left in place to help save money on the overall project. Meadow Road was reviewed prior to the project start and deemed to be in reasonable shape. Patches were made on some of the MSD trench settlement areas to prolong the pavement life. We will keep an eye on Meadow and the other areas that were not paved to squeeze out the most value for all our residents.

Clean-Up

We have asked the contractor to clean up excess asphalt that inadvertently spilled into the edge of yards, it is possible they may have missed some, if so, please scoop it up and dispose of it with your trash. For most public works paving jobs the spillage is left to be overtaken by mother nature in time, so we actually received better service from Hall Paving than most public agencies receive.

New Stop Bars and Signs

New stop bars have been painted to be behind the sidewalk crossings that

exist, a new sign configuration was installed at both Woodcreek Rd and Dell Road intersections with Valetta. The changes will hopefully provide a safer environment for the many pedestrians that use our sidewalks.

Future Permits

With new pavement Seneca Gardens has a new look. Comments have been received that roads are smoother and look crisper. This brings to the forefront the need to protect the pavement as best we can. Some protection is in place with some recently adjusted ordinances that spell out more directly what work requires a permit, cost of permits and potential fines for non-compliance. Many of the changes spell out NO COST permits that are solely in place to help project our streets and sidewalks. Dumpster permits are one that is no cost, but could result in a fine for non-compliance.
